

THE PAPER: You must use at least FOUR of the seven sources provided

- First paragraph: a bit of context, a bit of yourself ... just a couple or a few sentences: an appropriate anecdote? A vivid image? A startling statement?
- Second, Third paragraph: Embedding quotes from the source material and/or paraphrasing phrases and ideas in the sources, write in favor of your thesis
- Fourth paragraph: Concession*: A point or two or three that goes against your thesis. {and} Refutation*: Why this point is not strong enough to make you change your thesis?
- Fifth paragraph: conclusion and so what; don't repeat what you wrote, you might save one small, last point in your favor for the conclusion.

FYI: concede → admit to being wrong, surrender | concession → the act of conceding | refute → prove to be false, overthrow by evidence, argument, or proof | refutation → the act of refuting

THE ASSIGNMENT: word-process a second draft at home.

- ✓ ~1.25-1.5 pages, normal font, double-spaced, 1" margins, obsessively proofread, no cover page
- ✓ Interesting introduction
- ✓ 2 paragraphs of support
- ✓ 1 paragraph of concession and refutation
- ✓ brief conclusion
- ✓ "Works Cited" section

Examples:

Paraphrase, citation in parentheses not needed - why?

As indicated by the Harris polling group, public opinion shows a strong desire to keep the penny.

Paraphrase, parenthetical citation is called for:

State economies that depend on penny production for continued prosperity, such as Tennessee's, would be adversely affected by the discontinuation of the penny (Lewis).

Direct quote, citation in parentheses not needed:

According to William Safire, pennies are "literally more trouble than they are worth."

Direct quote, parenthetical citation called for:

Indeed, many believe that pennies are "literally more trouble than they are worth" (Safire).

Works cited section: Look at your sources, it's all done for you! For example:
